Purpose: To help someone see what the cost is in becoming a disciple of Jesus.

- II. Luke 5:1-11 The spirit of a Disciple
- A. Submission "Because you say so, I will."
 - 1. Submission yielding in spite of pride, lack of understanding, etc.
 - 2. Not opinions and traditions (John 8:31-32)
 - 3. What kind of book is the Bible? (John 17:17)
- B. Conviction "Go away from me. I am a sinful man!"
 - 1. What convicted Peter?
 - 2. Peter was afraid and wanted to separate himself from God's presence; Why?
- C. Purpose Jesus' response, "Don't be afraid; from now on, you will catch men."
 - 1. Is there a better cause for a child of God than John17:4? (Read Jesus' words in John 17:4. Is there any greater purpose for a child of God, then completing the work God gives him to do?)
 - 2. Don't be afraid, have faith in Jesus. Faith is the opposite of fear.
 - 3. Jesus' vision for His disciples was for them to be fishers of men. (John 15:8)

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| D. Commitment - They "left everything and followed Him."1. Being a disciple is a commitment. When is it most difficult to be a disciple of Jesus? (Luke 9:57) |
| 2. Why count the cost?(Luke 14:25-33 Jesus wanted people to know what they were committing themselves to in becoming a disciple.) Why does it seem to be so difficult to be committed to Jesus and His words? |
| 3. The cost of following Jesus will impact close relationships. a. Father/Mother - Will they be open and encouraging or will they disown you for committing to Christ or disown you for paying the price? (note: A minor needs to have parental consent before being immersed.) Do you think a minor should get parental consent for immersion? Why or why not? |
| b. Wife/Husband - Will they be excited or resentful, supportive or unsupportive? You will have to live as a Christian. Will they let you? On the plus side, a committed Christian makes a great spouse (1 Pet. 3:1-2). |
| c. Children - Will you be willing to make the necessary changes in attitudes and discipline? Will they accept your new lifestyle? Your commitment is a great opportunity for your children. It means they will be raised by a Christian parent. (I Tim. 4:16) |
| d. Brothers/Sisters - Will you be an influence on them or will they be an influence on you? |
| e. Boyfriend/Girlfriend - Read 2 Corinthians 6:14- 7:1 and 1 Corinthians 15:33. The Bible teaches that Christians are to marry Christians. If your girlfriend/boyfriend does not want to become a Christian, then you should consider ending the relationship. Why? |

(The Cost of Discipleship Continued)

Question: When you follow someone as a disciple, you become like that person. Do you want to be like Jesus? What must you give up or change to become the best disciple you can be of Jesus Christ?
